- "My Story" (1976), a controversial and acclaimed autobiography that explored her personal experiences and struggles.
- Das's writing explores the entire gamut of human relationships from the perspective of a woman.





LINE 15-25:

When the speaker looks at her mother standing a few yards from her at the airport security check, the mother's face is described by the simile" wan, pale as late winter's moon". A brilliant imagery of the winter moon is used in this part of the poem. "Winter" is used to evoke a sense of an ending (like the ageing mother), a certain frigid, inert state (like that of a corpse) and the inevitable darkness (death) that is to follow.



Also, moon has stereotypically received a feminine treatment and the simile "as a pale moon" is quite apt to describe the round, pale face of the aged mother. On seeing her mother, the poet persona experiences "that familiar old ache, my childhood fear". Though she doesn't specifically state what it actually is, we can safely infer that it is the fear of losing her mother.



LINE 26-28:

Despite being deeply thoughtful of her mother's present and future, the speaker can neither stop herself from going away from her mother nor can she stop her mother from going away from her forever. All she can do is part with the hope of seeing her mother again. The parting is made all the more poignant by the fact that though she hopes to see her mother, she fears that she might not. This intermingling of emotions of love, hope, longing, nostalgia, fear and a sense of helplessness at the face of the inevitable seems to find its way in the repetition of the final words of the poem: all I did was smile and smile and smile...



IMORTANT POINTS:

- The sprinting of the trees symbolizes the fast-passing years of human life from childhood to old age. This image, which shows movement and power, is in contrast to that of her old and frail mother.
- Children spilling out represent liveliness, vigor, fitness, beauty, and joy. This image
 contrasts dramatically with that of her mother, who is nearing her death and has
 grown frail, withdrawn, poor, and withered.



- The poet uses her mother's resemblance to 'the late winter moon' to suggest her imminent death. Winter, being the last season of the year, is synonymous with dormancy and life lessness. With old age, the mother of the poet has started to lose all its strength and radiance.
- The parting words of the poet, "see you soon, Amma," signify her farewell to her mother and an attempt to leave her optimistically and cheerfully.



The face of poet's mother was pale coloured, ashen - weak, painful, extremely aged. Her mother was too much fragile due to age - factor. Being too old, her signs of agedness could be seen over her wrinkled face. Poetess compared her mother's face with a corpse (dead body) as no signs of action can be seen over the face of a corpse similarly poet's mother face was pale coloured, still and weak.

Topic: Answer



Ans. As a child, Kamala Das was insecure about losing her mother just as all young children usually are.
