

believe in oneself to overcome all the hurdles of life.





The young seagull was alone on his ledge. His two brothers and his sister had already flown away the day before. He had been afraid to fly with them.




The Hungry Seagull

The young Seagull's parents tried hard to make him fly. They scolded him and threatened him to let him starve. Bur the young Seagull could not gain courage to fly. Then, they taunted him. Finally, the young Seagull's mother tempted him with food which resulted in making him fly.



How did the young Seagull and his family celebrate his first flight?

When the young Seagull started flying, he was filled with joy and delight. His family came near him and were flying around him. They celebrated the young Scagull's first flight. They screamed with joy and praised him. They even offered him pieces of fish to eat.

The phrase "The sight of the food maddened him" suggests that the young Seagull was very hungry. As the young Seagull was afraid to fly, his parents refused to give him any food. So, when he saw food, his hunger increased.

This suggests that the young Seagull was hungry and when he saw food his hunger increased.

It was his hunger that ultimately compelled him to fly. His hunger intensified when he saw his mother tearing up a piece of fish that lay at her feet. He cried to her, begging her to get some food. So, she flew towards him with a fish in her beak and stopped at some distance. Unable to control himself, the young Seagull dived for food. Naturally, his wings spread out and he began to fly.

Unlike his siblings, the poor Seagull could not gather enough courage to take his first flight. Thus, his parents taunted him for being a coward. They threatened and cajoled him so that he might take his first flight. His mother though it that hunger would make him fly looking for his food. She did this to remove his fear of flight.

Yes, I had a similar experience while learning to ride a bicycle in class VI. In my initial attempts, I fell down every time and developed a fear of cycling which was difficult to overcome.

My father encouraged me to overcome the fear and helped in learning cycling. He took me on a small hill near our village, made me sit and asked me to put my hands on the handle and feet on the pedals. When he pushed me, the cycle moved and I enjoyed it without fear, which developed my confidence. Thus, I overcame my fear of cycling and started riding a cycle regularly after a litcle practice.
